Mechanization of Farming and Modernizing Agriculture

Archival Collections

10031 Sarah Boley Papers

Diaries document the weather, daily life, politics, and agricultural conditions in Morton County (N.D.).

10157 North Dakota Oral History Project Records

Oral history interview transcripts, indexes to recorded oral history interviews, interview referral files, interview files, photographs, lists of donations to the Project, oral history interview transcripts relating to the Governor's Mansion, family histories, biographies, reminiscences, and manuscripts.

10185 Van Houten Brothers and Little Company Records

Letterpress copy books dealing with the sale and purchase of supplies and equipment, and an account book.

10190 Will Family Papers

The collection consists of the papers of Will family members, including Oscar Henry and Elvira Isabel "Belle" (Bird) Will, George Francis Will, Katherine (Sterrett) Will, Vera (Kangas) Will, Mabel (Will) Lumry, Margaret (Will) Exton, George Francis Will Jr., Elvira Susanna (Will) Arman, Oscar Henry Will II, and other descendants and relatives.

11454 Clarence Hartman Collection

Records from the Hartman farm in Hettinger County including photographs, handdrawn and printed maps of crop rotations, and machinery and equipment inventories

11497 Eastgate Family Collection

Notecards filed alphabetically with agricultural information such as inventory, yields, threshing, expenses, equipment, grain elevator receipts, recipe for homemade chick mash, manure hauled, etc. for various crops including alfalfa, sweet clover, flax, wheat, oats, barley, potatoes, and corn. There are several receipts, miscellaneous notes, bills and correspondence intermingled with the notecards.

Papers consist of correspondence, photographs, and sales brochures relating to several of Hoiland's inventions, including the wildoat separator, cow trainer, highway guards, and a furnace grate.

20475 Lester Clark Papers

Papers consist of notes, printed material, licenses, and letters concerning North Dakota seed companies and maintenance of farm equipment.

20745 Olivia (Hanson) Rhoads Papers

The manuscript includes a photocopy of her personal reminiscences of farm life entitled "My life at home from youth to grown-up," and sketches of early farm equipment.

21149 Bill Phillips Papers

Consists of "Growing up in Garrison (N.D.): Recollections of the 1930s," a reminiscence by Phillips about farming and Garrison during the Great Depression.

21195 Pazandak Family Collection (Dickey County, North Dakota)

Includes 17 photographs and post cards of the family farm with identification (ca. 1902-2010), a cassette tape with an interview about the farm, and copies and prints of articles about family members.

30640 Agriculture. Marketing Division. Marketing Service Program Files

Series contains correspondence, reports, memoranda, and printed materials related to the Marketing Division of the Department of Agriculture. Includes records related to various councils (Barley, Sunflower, Ag. Products Utilization, etc.), commodity organizations, foreign trade, Pride of Dakota, the Winter Show, trade shows, ag missions, Marketplace for Kids, Marketplace of Ideas, Mid-America International Agri-Trade Council (MIATCO), Ag in the Classroom (AITC), and other general information.

31580 Agriculture. Public Information. ND Products Council File.

Consists of Pride of Dakota Program Files, containing correspondence regarding the program, logo development with an advertising agency, and state fair correspondence and copies of contracts.
