Native American Innovation: Inventions, Everyday Tools, and Traditional Regalia

Long before European settlement of North America, Native Americans created their own tools and decorated regalia using resources from nature. Many of these artifacts have been found in North Dakota or preserved by families throughout generations. This pathfinder will lead researchers to several resources available at the North Dakota State Archives highlighting the artifacts, tools, and traditional regalia of North Dakota's Native American tribes.

00039 Monroe P. Killy Photograph Collection

Photographic prints mounted on album pages of Indian people on the Fort Berthold Reservation, log cabins, flint quarries, women working with hides and other images, mostly from 1942. This collection includes the album, prints, and negatives of the images. These images were taken mainly by Monroe P. Killy and collected by Melvin R. Gilmore.

00086 Paul Ewald Photograph Collection

Consists of prints and some copy negatives of several photographers on the Fort Berthold Reservation, primarily Gilbert L. Wilson, and also including Frances Densmore, Frank Fiske, Fred Olson, Sumner Matteson, and several unidentified photographers. Ewald wrote identification of many photographs in his collection based upon suggestions from the people of Fort Berthold. Images include celebrations and gatherings, dances, sweat lodges, Little Missouri camps, cradles, portraits, Buffalo Bird Woman, Wolf Chief, Goodbird, Indian crafts and skills, artifacts, wood gathering, gardening, food processing and cooking, earth lodges, bullboats, travois, and Indian cowboys.

10148 Paul Ewald Papers

Correspondence, printed material, subject files, reports, studies, photographs, slides, and notes relating to Indians, archeology, administration of the State Historical Society of North Dakota, historic sites, natural history, research, and personal and business affairs. Collection includes the diary and transcript of Joe Flying Eagle, 1913-1959.

10536 Martin P. Mosbrucker Collection

The majority of the collection consists of archaeological files, drawings, research, correspondence, and publications that support Mosbrucker's archaeological collection, which is among the collections in the Archaeology and Historic Preservation Division of the State Historical Society of North Dakota. Mosbrucker collected the artifacts with his wife, Lavinia, while living in Mandan (N.D.). The bulk of his collection came from the Boley site (the site of a Mandan earth lodge village, 1725-1785), and from Fort Abraham Lincoln. The rest of the collection was collected at various sites in North Dakota. The papers provide insight into Mosbrucker's collection, his system of organizing and describing the artifacts in the collection, and reflect his particular interests in the Mandan culture, history, and archaeological excavation.

11236 Josephine Waggoner Papers

Consists of manuscripts written by Josephine (McCarthy) Waggoner (1871-1943) including stories of Lakota and Dakota tribal members, their traditional customs and beliefs, Waggoner's own life experiences, and biographies of Lakota and Dakota chiefs. Information for many of the manuscripts was told to Waggoner by tribal members. Waggoner worked with several individuals, including Frank Herriott and George F. Will Sr. to edit her manuscripts for publication. The collection includes original manuscripts by Waggoner, edited versions by both men, and related correspondence. The collection also includes correspondence about litigation undertaken by Waggoner's descendants to reclaim her manuscripts.

11517 Marilyn Cross Hudson Collection

Research, writings, working and subject files, and other materials created or collected by Hudson. Major subjects include the written, recorded or photographed tribal and oral histories of the MHA Nation, Elbowoods, the bottom lands of the Missouri River prior to development of the Garrison Dam, Native American veterans, Native American ranching, and the Cross family. Included are records of tribal, state and federal government proceedings leading up to construction of the Garrison Dam and the subsequent impacts on the tribe and its communities. The collection includes: writings and correspondence of Martin Cross, father of Marilyn Cross Hudson, who served 6 terms on the MHA Nation Tribal Council, 4 of those terms as Chairman; photographs, records and documents of Chief Old Dog, grandfather of Marilyn Cross Hudson; cemetery records, both on and off the Fort Berthold Reservation; and boarding school records.

31376 Historical Society. Education and Interpretation. Editor's Files.

Series consists of correspondence, notes, and memoranda with authors, researchers, and staff concerning publication of the North Dakota Historical Quarterly, The Museum Review, North Dakota History, PlainsTalk, and other Society publications such as the Traveler's Companion and exhibit catalogs.
