Steamboats

In the 1830s, steamboats replaced keelboats on the Missouri River, transporting cargo and people. In 1858, steamboats were first used on the Red River to aid in the fur trade. This pathfinder will lead researchers to several resources available at the North Dakota State Archives highlighting the use of steamboats in North Dakota and their lasting effect on the state.

The collection includes the papers of Edward E. Heerman, his daughter, Minnie (Heerman) Naugle, and Minnie's daughter Halicia (Naugle) Whitehouse. Material belonging to Minnie's brother Elbert E. Heerman, son Heerman Naugle, and husband E. E. Naugle are also in the collection, but only to the extent that they were collected and saved by E. E., Minnie, and/or Halicia.

00270 Frances Densmore

Consists of photographs taken by Densmore on Fort Berthold Reservation during her study of Mandan and Hidatsa music and language.

10691 Roy Johnson and Louis Pfaller Collection, Folder #14.020

Newspaper clippings, articles, photographs, maps, pamphlets, and correspondence documenting the research of two historians, Johnson and Pfaller, on Major James McLaughlin, forts, battles, railroads, steamboats, exploration, pioneers, Native Americans, weather, murders, schools, missionaries, etc.
